Hello everybody

Instead I thought you might like to try my

banana cake recipe as dished up to the July committee meeting. I say 'my' recipe, but it originally came from my mother-in-law. It is very easy and foolproof. (Honestly!!).

Ingredients:

5 oz self raising flour
plus ¼ tsp bicarb
5 oz caster sugar
1 egg beaten
2 oz butter or margarine
1 ripe banana cut into circles
Few drops of vanilla essence
Chocolate chips (optional extra)



- Preheat your oven to 170 deg fan and line a 900 gm loaf tin or 7 inch round tin if you prefer.
- Mix all the ingredients together and beat well.
- Turn into the prepared tin and bake for about 40 minutes until skewer comes out clean

Now put the kettle on, make a cup of tea and enjoy.

Chichester Festival Theatre 18 July 2023

Eleven of us met in the foyer of Chichester Festival Theatre (CFT) for the back stage tour. We were welcomed by John and Susan, who are to be our guides. While in the foyer, we learned that CFT was opened by Leslie Evershed-Martin, (twice mayor of Chichester, city councillor and local optician) in 1962. In 1959, he had decided to realise



his ambition to build a theatre in Chichester. Firstly he set about raising the funds to start this enormous challenge. The first summer season produced 3 plays, The Chance, Broken Hearts and Uncle Banya. Actors in the early years included Sir Laurence Olivier, Joan Plowright, and Michael Redgrave.

We took the lift to the first floor, where we saw the wardrobe room, much smaller than I imagined, and we



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met the lady responsible for laundering most of the costumes after every performance. The pretty little tops worn by the Von Trapp children in the Sound of Music were actually being ironed while we were there.



Onto the wig, makeup and hairdressing room, the wigs can cost 2-3 thousand pound. We saw the scene: dock which is immediately behind the stage, and where scenery items are kept at the ready for quick scenery changes.

Finally we were invited on the thrust stage where we looked out over 1316 seats. John took a photo of us all. The visit was very interesting and we thanked John and Susan for making our tour most enjoyable.

We were all hungry by now so we trooped to the nearest pub for lunch. The staff there

accommodated us very well, the food was good too.

The Tallahassee Automobile Museum by Diana Marshall

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When I was asked to write a piece for the BPF newsletter and I was out of inspiration, Phil and I started to compile a list of the offbeat places we have visited in our 21 years of road trips in the USA. The popular and famous places don't really inspire me because their popularity renders them overly reported on travelling websites, blogs and documentaries.

Some of the most unconventional museums that spring to mind are the

Idaho Potato Museum in Blackfoot Idaho, the Banana Museum located in Mecca, California, and many other museums located in different states of the Continental USA.

In the end, I decided to write about The Tallahassee Automobile Museum (TAM), which turned out one of the most quirky museums we have visited in the land of the free. Phil's passion for motor car museums had lead us to visit almost compulsory every single one we come across in our travels. So, when he announced that we were visiting the TAM I was just expecting the predictable collection of classic cars exhibited in an average area, like most car museums. Oh, how wrong I was! Located in

> the capital of Florida, The TAM is more, much more than just a car collection. It's a dream museum for those interested in Americana and memorabilia from Native American artefacts to pianos. The two storybuilding of the museum has 100,000 square feet,

jam packed with exhibits that would keep visitors amazed even if some of the





collections are of no personal interest, because the variety of collections is very likely to contain one or another item of interest for everyone. Just the car showroom is big enough to spend a good hour or two just in that section, and there is still the rest of



the mind blowing collection of memorabilia. Over 160 cars in mint condition are displayed in the TAM, ranging from a 1900 Snell to a 2010 Camaro. There are Ford Model T, Model A, Cadillac, Auburn, Lincoln,

Volkswagen beetle, Corvette, Mustang, and many others, including authentic Batmobiles from the Hollywood movies used on set in "Batman Forever" and "Batman Returns". The museum features even a pink Elvismobile! What makes this museum so exceptional is the quirky array of memorabilia: there are large displays of motorcycles, boats, outboard motors, pedal cars, pocket knives, Native American artefacts, sports memorabilia, jukeboxes, lawnmowers, cash registers, golf carts, period clothing, fishing lures, sports memorabilia, adding machines, dolls, brass fans, toys, and many more. I couldn't list them all because my memory is not that reliable. I was impressed by the remarkable collection of pianos, which is considered by some as "the finest private collection of Steinways in the world!". The museum belongs to entrepreneur North Carolina

world!". The museum belongs to entrepreneur North Carolina born DeVoe Moore, who discovered his passion for collecting at the age of 9, when he started his first knife collection. During his junior years in high school, DeVoe Moore started to acquire an interest in cars, and over the course of the years he has



managed to assemble the amazing array of collectibles displayed in the museum. He was still collecting when we visited the museum, back in 2016. Diana
